Every year in October we highlight the work of the larger church of the United Church of Christ through our Neighbors in Need offering. The Neighbors in Need offering is one of the five special mission offerings of the United Church of Christ that support ministries of justice and compassion throughout our country. You can read more about this in this newsletter and throughout the month. This offering is one of the ways that we can, as a church, express our courage to work for our community. This summer, we spent time in the book of Ruth. Similar to this book is the book of Esther. It's a short story with a female heroine that doesn't directly use the name of God. Esther is the Hebrew Queen of the Persian King and she advocated for the protection of her people who faced persecution as a matter of national policy. Esther goes so far as to risk her life on behalf of God's people. The Festival or Purim, celebrated in the Spring, commemorates the saving of the Hebrew people. One of the things that Purim emphasizes is helping of the poor. Where do we stand up for those in our community? Is there something that we are known for? Are there people in our communities that need an advocate, someone to stand for them? I pray for the strength and courage of our church to be able to respond when the need arises. O God, our guide and help in alien and contentious places, as Esther worked courageously for the deliverance of your people, strengthen us to confront the oppressor and free the oppressed, so that all people may know the justice and unity of your realm. Amen.

Organ Repair Payoff



She shared the steps being taken to confirm that new personnel are satisfied in their positions so that good staffing can be maintained. They have had the kick-off of the Employee Giving Campaign. UPDATE FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

2018 HURRICANE RELIEF

Hurricane Florence caused catastrophic and prolonged significant river flooding to the Carolina coast and even inland. Rainfall totaled 40" in 3 days in some areas. More than a million Carolinians were ordered to evacuate, with 10 million in warning or watch areas left with power outages and damage to their homes or livelihood. More than 40 people lost their lives with this storm. The wide spread impact from this storm has prompted UCC Disaster Ministries to establish a 2018 Hurricane Relief Effort in response to the wide spread flooding and damage. Ohio Conference News!

Rev. Darrin and Doug Court represented you at the fall gathering of the Ohio Conference of the UCC. The underlying issue facing the conference was an awareness that the current structure of a central conference and five independent associations under its umbrella may have been appropriate for 1958 but does not seem sustainable in the 21st century. The explosion of technology and the current relative ease of travel provide opportunities for efficiency of efforts. Membership and attendance in our local congregations have already led to the merger of two associations into one and to a significant financial crisis for all parties.

Our two keynote speakers emphasized different perspectives but the same message of the impact the turbulent year 1968 and the half century following has had in their worlds. Rev. Andreas Muller from our partner church Evangelische Kirche in Westphalia, Germany spoke of the few young Christians who started a movement, behind a now defunct iron curtain, that has led to gender equality, social justice and immigration actions. Rev. Starsky Wilson, President and CEO of the Deaconess Foundation, spoke of the root causes of the sanitation worker strike in Memphis leading to the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King. Jim Crow laws may have been stricken and there are legal protections in place for minorities, but much still needs to change in the underlying economic and social systems. The realities, that only a man could have the skills to be president of the Deaconess Foundation (always been that way), Nazi sympathizers are attempting to get on German and U.S. ballots, and children are removed from their families as a deterrent, require a response from those of us who have been called by our baptism to be the Love of Christ in action.

The assembled delegates then put aside self-interest and association ego to move forward toward the unification of the Ohio Conference. This is the next step in a process that will take a few years as all Associations have constitutions and endowments to individually deal with. Currently a proposal has one conference body with three regional support centers. Each region would have a minister whose area of expertise would be shared by all of the conference. There would be one conference minister and one budget and accounting system with each support center having a budget within the shared budget. This proposal is more of a sand castle than a marble sculpture. There will be much negotiation and much compromise over what is likely to be a minimum of two years.
