THE INTERIM PASTOR'S NOTEBOOK:

Gentleness and peace vs. polarization

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We Christians live in an increasingly polarized age -- aided and abetted by our phone apps, our opinion-driven cable "news" channels and our social media. Add to that polarization the stresses of contested national elections and decades-long job losses in our region, and then real disunity becomes possible.

It would be nice to think that none of this affects the church.

But churches also reflect these divisions. Sadly, secular disunity can fracture the Body of Christ. However, a better understanding of how to live into the Gospel of Christ can really help re-unify the church and even show our non-churched neighbors the way out of polarization.

We Christians actually can become agents of healing.

We can become the influencers: for good and for unity.

I would like to suggest that Philippians 2: 1-15 can inform how we live into the Gospel of Christ. It can put a "Christ card" into our hands, and show us how to play it. This "Christ card" means consciously imitating Jesus -- and his approach -- in all we do. This also means imitating Jesus in how we relate to one another. And this can become a huge gift to our secular neighbors.

I also think imitating Jesus can also help overcome the predictable and normal group resistance of church systems (and all systems) to anything different. Even church growth often triggers resistance. We shouldn't be surprised if this happens. But the "Christ card" also leads to purposeful unity in the church. This will be important as we enter a season of discernment – as we ask what kind of church God is calling us to become in the next five to ten years.

I would even go so far as to suggest that Philippians 2: 1-15 – and the "Christ card" embedded in it -- is a major spiritual tool for healing church fractures. It moves Christians and church systems into becoming much more the cooperative, spiritual Body of Christ. Paul helpfully tells us in verses 3-5 (NRSV):

Differences of opinion are normal. They are not a sign of pathology or sin within the church or any other group. What is important is not eliminating conflict - we can't -- or pretending, against the evidence, that there is no conflict. There will always be differences and some conflict. What is important is how we deal constructively with differences of opinion and with normal, issue-oriented conflicts.

Philippians 4: 1-9 sets the stage for understanding the "Christ card" and how to play it constructively when we have differences. It might be worthwhile to re-read this whole passage to yourself before going any further. This passage is a plea for church unity even where there are differences of opinion. There were two female church leaders whose issues with one another were apparently spilling over into and hurting the larger church. Paul asks them "to be of the same mind in the Lord," in verse 2. Then in verse 4, he urges all of us to adopt what is often missing when there are differences of opinion or issue-oriented conflicts.

Paul urges public gentleness -- and then frank prayer with thanksgiving.

I'm really fascinated by Paul's appeal to gentleness. This is often what is missing from our polarized American public discourse. Often what seems to be prized is the opposite of gentleness. But Paul tells the Philippians, and us, in verse 5: "Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near."

Public gentleness is often so unexpected that it is disarming. But whether it works tactically or not, Paul implies that gentleness is what the Lord – who is near – wants from us.

"Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus."

Polarization and stresses are really nothing new for churches. None of today's church stresses were absent from the early church. There were conflicts and even fractures. And much of the New Testament deals with resolving differences of perspective and opinion.

Another problem in a polarized society or a polarized church is that the opponent is demonized, or "otherized." We only see what is bad in the person or group on the other side.

Instead, Paul urges us to put our focus on what is good – even in seasons of conflict and real danger. (And at the time he wrote this, Paul was on trial for his life in Rome, accused of being an enemy of the people and an enemy of Caesar.)

Remember that the context of all this is Paul's plea to constructively resolve serious disunity in the church. According to Paul, the outcome of all this is a peace that goes beyond our human understanding. This is stunning. This is not what we learned in the high school debate class. This is not what we expect to see during the current election cycle. But in Philippians 4: 8-9 (NRSV) we are told:

"Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you."

Of course, Paul is <u>not</u> telling us that we should tolerate bullies in the church. But as long as the disagreement in the church is really issueoriented, the response really should be public gentleness. There should also be an attempt to identify what is good and honorable about the other person and the other person's point of view. <u>"Think about these things."</u>

Wow! "And the God of peace will be with you."

Don't be polarized. Don't angrily demonize and "otherize." Don't focus on what is bad.

Finance Committee Report for the July "Visitor"

The Finance Committee is presenting this document as a summary of First United Church of Christ of Galion's "Half-Year" giving totals and a projection of our future budgetary considerations.

For the period ending June 26, 2022, our envelope and online giving has totaled \$62,876.52. This translates to 90% of our projected yearly budget on a monthly basis. In comparison, our giving for the previous year was running at \$73,856.82 as of the same date.

Members of the Finance Committee attended a meeting called for June 23, 2022 to address this issue. The Current Operating Fund of the budget has been placed under strain because of a combination of the gap in giving and an increase in expenses related to utilities and acquiring a new interim Minister and Church Secretary. After considerable discussion, the Committee decided that the most prudent course of action lay in revamping the 2022 budget to reflect the present realities. As a consequence, Consistory will be asked to approve a "new" recommended budget to carry us to the end of the year.

The Finance Committee recognizes that a number of these expenses will drop off as time progresses. In the meantime, it is our hope that the Congregation continues its support of our Church and its missions.

Instead, <u>"be of the same mind in the Lord.</u>" Instead, <u>"let your gentle-ness be known to everyone.</u>" Instead, <u>"if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."</u>

There is also a major theological reason to turn to Christ himself whenever we face polarization in the church. According to the book of Ephesians, whenever there are two groups operating in good faith that have opposing interests, or opposing opinions, or even opposing identities, Christ wants to be a bridge and close the gap. Where there are barriers, Christ knocks them down, if we consent.


He takes the two—us and them—and creates one new us.

This is nothing short of theologically miraculous. This miraculous unification is the work of the cross of Christ. This is exactly the same unifying, depolarizing message as that of the Christ-hymn discussion found in Philippians 2. Yet, Christ and his cross unifies us without obliterating the uniqueness of either group. Only Christ can truly create unity within diversity. In Ephesians 2: 14-18 (NRSV), we learn:

<u>"For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into</u> one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us ... that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body, through the cross ... for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father."

Remember, differences of opinion and issue-oriented conflicts are humanly normal. But resolving those conflicts in a Christ-centered and Christ-powered way that honors the best of the other person or the other group is divinely miraculous. So playing the "Christ card" leads to the peace of Christ among us. This is the internal Work of Christ in you, the hope of glory. May it be so among us. Amen.
