

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I'm really delighted to have been called by all of you to be your intentional interim pastor for the next year or so. I hope we can prayerfully work, explore and plan together toward the successful call of -- and then ministry with -- a new settled pastor.

Thank-you for the warm welcome all of you have given me.

My goal is to partner with you, and with God, to help you plow and fit the ground. This while you prepare to call and plant the right new settled pastor here in Galion at the proper season. So I'm focused on taking the time now to help us discern and align with God's preferred intermediate vision for First United Church of Christ, Galion. Doing this now greatly increases the likelihood she and you will be able to more effectively do the Work of Christ here in Galion.

Figuring out first where we are going really boosts the chances of getting there.

(Far too many churches rush the search process before they have a clear idea where God wants them to go. So knowing "where" greatly helps in finding the "who" to lead us there.)

A key line in the Lord's Prayer is: "Thy will be done on earth..." This is the core idea. It sure applies to me. And all of us as individuals. It also applies to churches. "They will be done."

I've been impressed so far by your commitment to that Work of Christ and to missions and meaningful outreach into the community. I'm hoping we can build out that obvious strength, shifting from maintenance to even more effective mission. In other words: less defense, more meaningful action. Indeed, Christianity is also really a fun faith. So I'm hoping that despite the congregational challenges of a global pandemic, that there will be lots of openings for fun -- and personal wonder and encouragement.

In all seasons and situations, Jesus wants his church to continue to grow in fruitfulness. In John 15: 1-8 (NRSV), Jesus tells his disciples, including us:

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ... Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ... Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit... My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

With all this in mind, I wanted to focus us in my first newsletter article on a key issue all churches face. Even with the strengths of First United Church of Christ, this is an issue to which we always need to pay attention. It was also an issue for all the earliest apostles and disciples.

That issue is welcome.

But before I go further, I wanted to give you a little information about me and my ministry with you.

### My ministry

Because I will be serving with you as a part-time pastor, I will have some limitations on my time and availability. I will also have to return as much of the ministry of the church as is proper and practical to the people of God, who are a priesthood of all believers. This is as it really should be. And this idea has strong roots in the Reform tradition of the United Church of Christ. (Remember that our friend Paul in the New Testament was also a part-timer. And his ministry was extremely effective and consequential. So part-time ministry can be done well -- and even on a very large scale.)

Just to be clear, however, I plan to make myself as accessible as possible.

Regardless of my schedule, I intend to respond to emergencies of life and the pastorate.

I will do some of my worship and sermon preparation and work for you at my home near Canton. I will be maintaining a full home office there, as well as an office in the church building.

Generally, I can visit or meet with church members and others on Sunday afternoons and evenings and all day Mondays. I may also stay over some Tuesdays and other days, as needed. This may also adjust a bit as we get settled in and find out what the needs and opportunities are.

In the next few weeks, I would like to visit as many of you as can tolerate a pastoral visit. Please give me a call on my cell phone at 330-858-3406 to set this up, or to be in touch with me about any other matters. I frequently check for messages on my cell phone. ### Welcome


Coming back to the key issue of welcome -- as we confront decades of slowly dwindling attendance and what to do about it -- we will always be tempted to keep the focus on ourselves.

Or perhaps, we will be tempted to focus on just doing those fairly easy things that would, we think, boost the numbers. More nickels, more noses. We might think that some extra money and higher numbers would allow us to just keep doing things the ways we've always done them. (But this is still rather backwards thinking: This thinking would really seek to have our neighbors serving us, rather than our serving them. And this ignores finding God's call for us right now.)

Even though there is and will be lots to take care of internally, let's remember that our primary focus as a church really needs to be external: <u>loving God</u> and <u>loving our neighbors</u>.

For starters, I would suggest that we view almost every decision we make in the next few months from the perspective of welcome: "How will this decision affect our welcome of people in our community who are not with us yet?"

Welcome is a critical issue for every congregation, in every generation.

Thank you to all that provided a box of staples for our local food pantry. Our two adopted families each received a box of staples along with over 25 boxes for local hungry families.

To the extent that we effectively welcome other people, now outside our congregation, we are also welcoming Jesus into the very midst of our congregational life. And to the extent that we fail to effectively welcome others, we really cut ourselves off, not only from our community, but also from God.

Jesus discussed this in Mark 9: 36-37 (NRSV):

"Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, 'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."

Anyone who is new to a congregation – or who has been away for a significant time – is going to be uncertain and vulnerable and coming to us rather like a child. So we need to be very careful and intentional about our welcome – and make sure we do not thoughtlessly discourage or signal that we are really not that interested in the person, or in her kind of person, or in the core interests or issues of those outside the congregation now.

### Love of neighbor

In the coming weeks and months, as we pray and plan together, and in our ordinary worship behavior, let's ask this question of ourselves: "Will this action, behavior or decision help us more effectively welcome, affirm and embrace the people whom Jesus sends our way, or whom Jesus wants us to seek out in our community?"

Sometimes the barriers to welcome are invisible to us. So we have to be looking for them and asking about them -- and then fixing them. Sometimes welcome involves an inconvenience to us. This could mean learning a new song with a verse in a different language, or just going out of our way to greet a visitor and make sure his needs are met, or that she feels comfortable.

In all of this, we need to try to put ourselves in the shoes of the other person. We need to try to meet the other person, as best we can, on his terms, and even on his turf.

Jesus teaches us in Matthew 7:12 (NRSV):

"In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets."

May it be so. Amen.

# FIRST UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, GALION, OHIO ANNUAL MEETING, JANUARY 24, 2021

Trustee Kevin Cotsmire called the virtual meeting to order at 10:45 AM. The agenda, budget, financial report, minutes and mail in ballots were distributed to all by email and/or The Visitor. Kevin noted to please have those in front of you. Annual reports are available for pick up during office hours or via email. Ballots need to be mailed/returned to the church by next Sunday (January 31, 2021). Adair was thanked for getting out the agenda and the budget. With the meeting being virtual, Kevin reminded members they can ask a question or make a comment on Facebook or YouTube. Because of an online speaking delay due to the virtual meeting, Brian Treisch moved to pass most motions without objection unless we see an objection posted on line. Mary Ann Stone seconded the motion.

Brian Treisch made a motion to close nominations for Consistory at this time. Doug Court seconded the motion. Rev. Darrin Harvey began the meeting with a reading of Paul's letter to the Ephesians, Chapter 4, 11 through 16 and an opening prayer.

The agenda for the meeting was printed in the January 2021 Visitor. Brian Treisch moved to adopt the agenda as printed. Lisa Eichhorn seconded the motion.

The minutes of the January 26, 2020, Annual Meeting were printed in the January 2021 Visitor. Doug Stone moved to adopt the minutes as presented. Brian Treisch seconded the motion.

Finance Committee Chairperson Stacey Hocker was invited to the podium to review the 2020 Financial Report. Stacey thanked the Finance Committee members and gave special thanks to Mary Ann Stone for all she does and to Doug Court for doing the budget. Stacey noted that in March 2020 we entered a time of fear and the unknown along with shutdowns. She added that the church has been very adaptable. It has been a difficult year for the church, but she feels good about the church. Giving was down a little in 2020, but the congregation has continued to give and she stated she is impressed with the faithful commitment of the members. Stacey noted we are a 5 for 5 church for UCC Mission giving. \$25,000 was donated to the Church's Wider Mission, due in part to a vibrant Mission Committee. Carry Out meals have continued and carry a hearty balance. The Organ Report as of January 1, 2021 has a \$30,000 balance. Last year's budget had \$20,000 in Reserve Funds.

No Reserve Funds were used. Some expenses decreased and expenses were closely monitored. The 2021 Budget has an expense decrease of almost \$7,000 and \$22,000 budgeted in Reserve Funds. Stacey noted the Reserve Funds allow for flexibility in budgeting, with the hope the Fund does not have to be used. She noted the increase in the stock market along with the very conservative management of funds contribute to the very positive financial report. Also noted were no salary increases in the budget. Stacey noted the church is financially strong for which she thanked everyone. Doug Court emphasized the church has a balanced budget due to the foresight of members 40 to 50 years ago when three Trust Funds were developed (Memorial Endowment, Kiss and Sterrett). 26.4% has come from investment income and building use. 2020 year end saw a balance of \$845.000 with \$22,000 being taken out. Doug stated anyone with questions about the finances to not hesitate to ask committee members, and encouraged church members when planning their estate to remember the church. Doug Court moved to adopt the 2020 Financial Reports as presented. Lisa Eichhorn seconded the motion. Brian Treisch moved to adopt the 2021 Budget as presented. Jim Sulser seconded the motion. Kevin reminded all members to mail in their ballot postcards.

Pastor Darrin announced the candidates for Consistory and thanked Sandy Powell for her work in coordinating the nominations.

The outgoing consistory members, Trustee: Kevin Cotsmire; Elder: Sandy Powell; Deacons: Angie Brocwell and Carol Schreck, were thanked by Pastor Darrin for all they have done, noting he will be paying a visit to each within the next week or two to drop off an item.

Hearing no further business, Brian Treisch moved to close the 2021 Annual Meeting. Doug Stone seconded the motion. Kevin thanked everyone for adjusting and adapting to the meeting and the year. Pastor Darrin offered a blessing of the meeting, noting there is no Spaghetti Dinner this year.
