

Your Congregational Strengths

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

During Lent and now during Holy Week, it is certainly appropriate to be doing searching self-appraisals of our lives and our congregation. It is appropriate to really seek to know -- through prayer and interacting with God during this season -- our sins and failings.

It is appropriate to seek God's vision -- to really see ourselves and our situations clearly.

It is appropriate to really seek to hear Jesus' voice, so we can really follow him and then do his work in our communities and in our lives.

As the hymn "Cleanse Me" (No. 657 in our hymnal) prays:

"Search me, O God, and know my heart today. Try me, O Savior, know my thoughts, I pray. See if there be some wicked way in me. Cleanse me from every sin and set me free."

Nevertheless, as we do this, we can sometimes lose sight of the personal strengths and congregational strengths that God has also given us through Jesus Christ.

So even as we do searching congregational self-appraisals during our pastoral search process, I thought it would be helpful for me to name some of the congregational strengths that I have observed as your intentional interim pastor.

If we lose sight of our strengths, dealing with our sins and flaws can be overwhelming.

What has impressed me the most about First United Church of Christ of Galion is that you have a critical mass in leadership that is unusually responsive to the direction and lead of the Holy Spirit.

This is evidenced by the work of the Discernment Team, its affirmation by Consistory and then by the congregation at the annual meeting.

This sort of Holy-Spirited work is very, very fragile. It is very easy to subvert.

Even though there were some misgivings about this whole discernment process, it turned out to be very, very productive. God clearly showed up as the Discernment Team worked, prayed, studied and discussed things for half a year.

In my pastoral experience, I would rate this congregation as probably the No. 1 congregation I have served for its responsiveness to the direction and lead of the Holy Spirit. If not No. 1, it is certainly in a pretty close tie for the top spot. And many congregations lack this strength.

Another significant strength that you and I have discovered over the last year is that you really have the ability -- in group settings -- to collectively discuss and process difficult topics in civil and productive ways.

This is evidenced by the discussions about the difficult topics of race and how Christians should respond to racism that took place after our Lenten Love Feast with Communion several weeks ago. In responding to questions posed by the Rev. Dr. Jack Sullivan Jr., each of our table groups had productive and surprisingly similar things to say. And participants in these discussions often began with quite divergent cultural perspectives.

(But I have witnessed similar discussions in other congregations go very badly astray.)

This strength of yours – the ability and potential in group settings to process difficult topics in a civil way – was also in evidence during most of our cottage meetings a year ago.

However, great congregational or individual strengths are often balanced by significant weaknesses. (We can see this with the publicly expressed courage but then private betrayals by Peter and the other Disciples discussed in Luke 22.)

Rather than despair about our weaknesses and sins -- perhaps even saying "There's no hope" – I believe the solution is prayer.

Let's prayerfully rejoice and praise God for God-given strengths. But then, especially during this season, let's also faithfully entrust our weaknesses to God in prayer.

As we learn in I John 5: 14-15 (NIV):

"This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us – whatever we ask – we know that we have what we asked of him."

May it be so for all of us collectively, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Recap of the Consistory meeting. Held Tuesday, March 14, 2023 at 7:00 pm

In attendance were: Sue Bloom, Dan Brown, Dan Eichhorn, Judy Eichhorn, Sandy Keller, Sandy Kennedy, Shelly Kurtzman, Todd Rudolph, Bill Shifley,

Janet Snyder, Doug Stone, and Brian Treisch. In Pastor's absence, Brian called the meeting to order, leading the group in prayer.

Elder's report – Doug Stone reported that the Elders met on Monday, March 13, 2023, with Reverend Meyer regarding preparing our Church for the new minister.

Deacon's report – Coverage for the Easter season was discussed and a monthly schedule of coverage was created. Nursery coverage discussed now that a family with young children are attending.

Trustees' report – Basketball hoop for parking lot still under consideration. Children's toilet and the urinal in the downstairs men's bathroom are not working due to the hard rain. A brief recap was given of other building projects such as painting, finishing and water seeping in from the kitchen door during the heavy rains.

Mission Committee – Blanket sales and Souper-Bowl fund raisers were well supported. Easter flowers are now available to be ordered until Friday, March 31. April's mission is the assembly of cleaning buckets and supplies for those in disaster areas. May's mission fundraiser will be the sale of geraniums. This committee meets quarterly. Next meeting is Tuesday, May 30 at 7:00pm and everyone is welcome to attend.

Finance Committee – Recap of endowment funds being charged for church usage. Error made, and subsequently corrected, that the funds actually were taken from the Capital fund. Two other transfers will be going to the Endowment Fund and are pending the final steps to complete the transfers.

A thank you letter was received from Gloria Hurwitz, VP of Advancement for UC Homes, for the Christmas stockings received. It was agreed to give a scholarship of \$500 to an employee. The determination of the employee will be made in the next two months.

The Gift Cart has been available at Fairhaven on three Tuesdays thus far this year (Jan. 10th, Feb 14th, and Mar. 14th). What is being offered is a mixture of items that used to be in the Gift Shop and some additional snack items. Gross donations received thus far are \$70, \$68, and \$50 respectively.
